The Chilterns International Women's Day Conference, organised by the Chalk, Cherries and Chairs Landscape Partnership Scheme celebrates the women who excelled in some of the traditional crafts, skills and work found in the Chilterns Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty.

Record books tell us that the development of a modern local economy was driven by the men of the High Wycombe furniture trade, agricultural merchants and landowning farmers. The lives and critical importance of contributions made by the working women in this area has often been overlooked.

Thank you for joining us in the stunning surrounds of Missenden Abbey, a former medieval abbey with a history of over 800 years to explore the work of the women past, present and future living in and around the woodlands and grass meadows of the Chilterns Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty.

From weavers and sculptors, to historians and policy makers, we're excited to have a host of experts presenting and demonstrating as part of our one day conference on International Women's Day today.

Chalk, Cherries and Chairs

Chalk, Cherries & Chairs is an ambitious five-year scheme which connects local people and communities of the Central Chilterns to the area's natural environment and cultural heritage. Ours is a precious, ever changing landscape with a fascinating history. Our 18 interweaving projects are designed to promote opportunities for all to explore, protect and celebrate the features of the Chilterns landscape, providing small grants to encourage community initiatives and offering volunteering and learning opportunities across our three themes of nature, people and history.

We aim to develop and secure closer partnership working between communities of interest and local authorities in order to improve local land management, raise community awareness of what makes the Chilterns so special, diversify and increase the number of people receiving the benefits of access to the countryside and provide learning and skills development opportunities for the dedicated volunteers participating in work to restore or conserve our natural environment and record or celebrate our history.

Chalk, Cherries & Chairs is a project of the Chilterns Conservation Board delivered in partnership with Amersham Museum, Berkshire, Buckinghamshire and Oxfordshire Wildlife Trust, Buckinghamshire County Council, Buckinghamshire New University, Chiltern Rangers, Chiltern Society and the National Trust, principally funded by the National Lottery Heritage Fund and the HS2 Community Environment Fund.

Woodlanders' Lives and Landscapes

The Chilterns, regarded in popular imagination as a beautiful landscape of beechwoods, chalk escarpments and picturesque villages, was for more than two centuries a unique industrial landscape. The woods and villages were alive with furniture-making, wood-ware, straw-plaiting, lace-making and tambour-beading (the technique of applying beading and sequins for the fashion industry).

We already know quite a lot about work in these rural trades and the artefacts that were produced but we know much less about what life was like for those involved. Our volunteer researchers are finding out how the people – especially the women and children – who made their living in these woodland and home-based industries went about their daily lives.


How can you get involved?

Volunteer with Woodlanders' Lives and Landscapes to research the lives of the men, women and children who worked in rural and domestic industries in the villages and woods of the Central Chilterns – chairmaking, lacemaking, plaiting straw (for hats), and tambour beading (for fashion). Gain experience and training in:

- Family history research
- Archive research
- Recording oral histories
- Guided walks
- Social media
- Information-sharing and interpretation

Helena is Associate Professor of Design Studies at Buckinghamshire New University in High Wycombe where she has taught design history for many years. Her research focussed on the social landscapes of industry, from those of eighteenth-century industrial villages, to office pleasure gardens today. Helena is now retired from teaching and leading the Woodlanders' Lives and Landscapes social history project, part of the Chalk, Cherries and Chairs Landscape Partnership. She is working with a team of volunteers to connect Chilterns' people more closely to their cultural heritage. She feels very lucky to be working with so many excellent researchers.

My hand-built burnished ceramics explore the beauty of the form, whilst referencing the natural world, and the enduring qualities of ancient pots in national collections across the world. My work is fired in a large open pit on our farm in the

Chiltern Hills. It is surrounded by organic material, and a large fire of fallen timber from surrounding woodland is built over it. The resulting alchemy transforms the surface into a myriad of different patterns and colours, and surface and form become seamlessly unified, as in nature, with each piece that survives being totally unique.

Hattie Speed (they/them) is an award-winning designer-maker and creator of the multi-disciplinary project This Girl Makes. They graduated from Rycotewood Furniture Centre (Oxford) in 2018 with a first class honours degree in Furniture Design and Make, and has since worked for Ercol Furniture, Oxford University Hospitals (NHS) and Rycotewood Furniture. Their interests are education and outreach, as well as the healing and therapeutic qualities of craft. They recently finished a six-week artist residency at Ebor Studio (Greater Manchester) exploring the stages of grief through performance and furniture making.

Majeda Clarke is an award winning artist with a multidisciplinary approach to design. A Cockpit Arts Awardee, she has received the British Muslim Award for Creativity and won the New Designers One Year In Award. Majeda's work has been selected as a Liberty 'Future Collectible' and Design Nation's 20 icons at 20 to celebrate its 20 years. Collaborations include commissions for the centenary of the Edwardian explorer, Isobel Wylie Hutchison, blankets for Fortnum and Mason and public engagement art for the UNHCR. With a keen interest in the future of craft as a discipline and promoting diverse access, Majeda is a mentor and Trustee at The Crafts Council. The multilayered landscape of both Britain and her birth country, Bangladesh, are reflected in her bold, geometric weaves.

Visit our exhibition - 'Hidden Hands: Women and work in the Chilterns'

Historically, women's paid work has often been belittled and forgotten. Our new exhibition hunts down the hidden women's work in Chilterns villages that formed a crucial part of the local economy during the nineteenth and twentieth centuries.

Discover how the luxury goods made by these highly skilled workers contrast with the harsh reality of working long and poorly paid hours from their homes.

Hear stories of straw plaiting in Buckland; caning and rushing chair seats in West Wycombe; lace making in Great Hampden; and tambour beading in Holmer Green. Come to learn more about the crafts, women's lives and their impact on the Chilterns.

The six month long exhibition will open at Wycombe Museum on 7th March, and has been curated by the Woodlanders' Lives and Landscapes project team in partnership with Wycombe Museum, and forms the museum's Summer Exhibition. A series of events including Discover and Make sessions, a family day, lacemaking workshop, Bodgers Pub Tour and a 'memory day' will take place alongside the exhibition.
