








- · He tells me about the session afterwards






Where are they now?! It may be a few years since your young person took part in a Chiltern Rangers programme/project. What are they up to now and how far did participating in a inspire or influence their choices for further study, interest or employment

- xx is now at Oxford University studying French. He is a member of the RSPB Youth Council and is involved in many environmental groups.
- At 6th form studying Maths, Chem and Biology A Levels hoping to study medicine at university
- Definitely helped! He is currently in New Zealand having spent 1 year in Australia, working on farms and all sorts of other projects including those with wildlife and sustainable food production.
- My son is going to study Earth and Environmental Science. Participating in New Shoots helped consolidate an existing interest and passion for the subject.
- It was a great social experience and a positive step to show he could join a group and do something different to the normal pattern of home and school. This boosted confidence and was great to put on application forms. It has not specifically influenced life choices but provided invaluable opportunities that helped shape the rounded individual he is.
- My daughter is just sitting her A levels. She is going to take a year out but then wants to go to uni to study Human Sciences which is a mix of biology, psychology, geography and sociology. She still enjoys getting outside when she can and taking photos of nature.
- xx is going into yr4 at Exeter uni studying zoology, and just completed a study year abroad in Singapore. CR influenced her decision what to study and where. Also CR gave her skills, knowledge and confidence regarding habitat management and species identification.
- Doing Musical Theatre degree, but it did help him get a place in a very competitive market, by demonstrating that he has outside interests and gave him something else to talk about. Also he was able to use it to get a place on Camp America last summer
- My daughter is about to commence year 3 at university studying Ecology and Conservation. She is really enjoying her degree and definitely planning working in this field in the future. Chiltern New Shoots and Chiltern Rangers really inspired her curiosity for learning and developing her skills in these areas.
- Thank you so much to all the team for their passion in providing such an amazing opportunity. As a parent it also opened my eyes to the work Chiltern Rangers provides for our local communities which is invaluable.
- He is now doing a physical geography degree at Southampton uni, his dissertation is on the diminishing hedge rows and the impact on butterfly population. This is directly from his butterfly fly survey on chalk downs with new shoots!
- Currently doing A levels so focusing on those, still enjoys nature identifying butterflies and birds etc. Has been asking about nature/conservation clubs on Uni visits
- Has relocated ti the Lake District and landed her dream job
- Working for the Cumbrian Wildlife Trust
- Finish in July Btec level 3 animal management extended diploma at Merristwood college. Uni offers for wildlife and conservation foundation degree at sparsholt and Merristwood but this week she accepted a job as a farm technician at a secondary school looking after the animals. She still volunteers as a cubs leader and runs sessions relating to wildlife, nature and conservation
- Currently doing landscape & construction work while he is pursuing his application with the Army
- University studying Politics.
- We have only been a few times due to other commitments but want to continue to volunteer
- Still at school, helping inform her Further Ed choices
- Waiting for university offer
- My oldest grandson is still at school, but no longer interested in doing stuff with me, but it was great while it lasted. I have already done a couple of events with his little brother and hope to continue to do so.

- They are only 14 yrs old and still keen on CR and in FTE
- Interested in further study eg Bio undergraduate, also regular volunteer with local conservation charity
- They have just graduated with a Fashion Degree. The sessions gave her a chance to be creative she was painting some murals with Dan from decreate. Her volunteering for a local charity looked good on her CV and she found it easier to be selected for interviews I hope.
- Just finished last session. Hopes to continue volunteering for Chiltern Rangers and perhaps join another group programme.
- Hoping they will continue in the future as they are going to enter year 6 after the summer holidays (they are age 10 twins but that age was not in the selection available but I wanted to give feedback).
- Still at school
- He's an assistant greenkeeper at Wycombe Heights (I appreciate that golf courses are not the favourite places of conservationists). His time with the Chiltern Rangers showed him that he loves working outdoors and with a few, but not too many, people. He learnt that he enjoys physical activity and that that doesn't have to be sport. He really enjoyed being allowed to use tools and how to use them safely. The opportunities he was given by the Chiltern Rangers massively built his confidence and also gave him an amazing CV when it came to looking for a job.


